Deliverable #1: Individual Chapter Outline

I. Intro- Family and Intimate-Partner Violence

1. Family Violence: any rough and illegitimate use of physical force, aggression or verbal abuse by one family member toward another.
2. Intimate-Partner Violence: Once known as domestic violence is the physical, social or psychological harm imposed by a current spouse or partner.
3. Different types of family violence and IPV can happen at any age and with any gender. To be further discussed and detailed:
 1. Battering
 2. Stalking and Cyberstalking
 3. Violence Against Children
 4. Elder Abuse
4. To show how big of a problem it has become. Based on reported cases: 6-8 million women and children are victimized each year as a result of IPV. Nearly 5 children die every day as a result of abuse and neglect.

II. Battering

1. Over 85% of domestic violence victims are women.
2. Facts:
 1. More common in lower socioeconomic levels and in relationships with a high degree of conflict where they can't negotiate or compromise.
 2. Over 25% of women report having being physically assaulted or raped, over 50% report some sort of abuse in a relationship.
 3. More than 10% of cases, the abused happened longer than 20 years.
 4. Young people: 1.5 million high school students are victims of physical violence while on a date.
3. Abuse happens because people have a need to control the other person and believe that they are entitled to it no matter the cost.
4. Common characteristics of abusers:
 1. History of violent behavior
 2. Traditional beliefs about gender roles
 3. Problems with alcohol abuse
 4. Low self-esteem
5. Three Phase Cycle of Abuse
 1. Period of increasing tension
 2. A violent explosion and loss of control
 3. Period of Contriteness- abuser begs for forgiveness and promises it won't happen again
6. Why do women stay?
 1. Economically dependent
 2. Feel trapped or fear retaliation if they leave
 3. Children need a father
 4. Have low self-esteem themselves
 5. Believe they will stop and feel pity for them
7. Only leave when violence must stop

1. Battered Women Shelters offer physical protection, counseling, support and additional assistance

III. **Stalking and Cyber Stalking**

1. Stalking: harassing behaviors such as following or spying on a person and making verbal, written or implied threats.
2. Facts:
 1. U.S. 7 million women and men are stalked each year
 2. 2/3 of stalkers are men
 3. 3/4 women victims are stalked by current or former intimate partners; over 2/3 of these victims had been physically or sexually assaulted when in the relationship
 4. 1/5 cases involve weapons accompanying the threats
 5. Stalking of female college students is more prevalent than the rest of the country
3. Stalkers Goal: control or scare the victim or keep them in a relationship, usually lasting a year or less.
4. **Cyberstalking**
 1. Definition: use of internet, e-mail, chat rooms, social media sites or other electronic means to stalk another person
 2. Same as offline stalking: majority of cyber stalkers are males and the victims are female
 3. Stalkers may: send messages or may encourage others to harass the victim by impersonating the victim and posting inflammatory messages and personal information on chat rooms and blogs
 4. **Stay Safe:**
 1. Avoid using your real name
 2. Avoid using information that can identify you
 3. Do not share personal information in public spaces
 4. Filter unwanted e-mails
 5. Use passwords that are unique and contain many characters; numbers, capitals, etc.
 6. Set your social media profiles to "private"
 7. Do not respond to the harasser- contact the harasser's internet services provider (ISP) - they can stop or close the account.
 1. Save all communication for evidence and contact ISP and the local police.

IV. **Violence Against Children**

1. Facts:
 1. 2011 there were more than 3 million reports of alleged abuse and neglect in the U.S. with the number of children involved being close to 6 million
 2. Nearly 1 million involve physical abuse and 4 million were a result of neglect
2. Characteristics of Parents Who Abuse
 1. Low self-esteem
 2. Believe in physical punishment
 3. Poor marital relationship

4. Have been abused themselves (not all people who were abused go up to abuse their children)
3. Common Characteristics of Families Involved in Child Abuse
 1. Poverty, unemployment and social isolation
 2. External stressors related to socioeconomic and environmental factors are related to neglect; interpersonal stressors are related to abuse
 3. Single parent families are at a higher risk of abuse
- V. **Elder Abuse**
 1. Facts:
 1. Over 4 million older adults are abused, exploited or mistreated by someone who is supposed to care and protect them
 2. Only 1/24 cases are actually reported
 2. Most abusers are family members that are also caregivers
 3. Different Types of Elder Abuse:
 1. Physical, sexual or emotional abuse (1/6 reported cases)
 2. Financial exploitation (1/8 reported cases)
 3. Neglect
 4. Abandonment
 4. Characteristics: caring for a dependent adult becomes too stressful for the caregiver
 5. Alternatives:
 1. Adult daycare centers, education and public care centers
- VI. **Conclusion**
 1. There are many forms of abuse and no one is safe from it- it can happen at any age and in any household.
 2. There are homes and relationships that are considered higher risk however that does not always indicate abuse will happen
 3. There are many centers and programs in place to help victims move on from the abusive relationship
 4. People should be aware of the warning signs and leave abusive situations for their safety and well-being.

Summary of Web site content:

- This website defines domestic violence and discusses all the different types of abuse. The subcategories include physical, sexual, emotional, economic or psychological actions or threats of actions that influence another person. This includes behaviors that intimidate, manipulate, humiliate, isolate, frighten, terrorize, coerce, threaten, blame, hurt, injure or wound someone. The website then goes on to further define each subcategory previously mentioned. It also

states that domestic violence can happen to anyone regardless of race, age, sexual orientation, religion or gender. Domestic violence not only affects those abused but it can have a substantial effect on family members, friends, co-workers, other witnesses and the community at large. Children are greatly affected by living within an abusive environment teaching them that violence is a normal way of life therefore increasing their risk of becoming society's next generation of abusers and victims. I believe this is a good website because it is affiliated with the government and also provides the date it was updated on as well as other reliable websites as sources.

Summary of Web site content:

- This website states that every year more than 3 million reports of child abuse are made in the United States. It defines child abuse as when a parent or caregiver, whether through action or failing to act, causes injury, death, emotional harm or risk of serious harm to a child. There are many forms of child maltreatment including neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, exploitation and emotional abuse. It then goes on to provide definitions of each type of abuse and gives a statistic associated with each one. For example 23.8% of adults report being physically abused as a child. The website also provides resources for help if someone is experiencing or witnessing child abuse. This website is a legitimate organization that provides contact information and helpful/reliable links.

Summary of Web site content:

- States have enacted “cyberstalking” and “cyberharassment” laws or have laws to help decrease and regulate electronic forms of communication within more traditional stalking or harassment laws. The website provides a chart which identifies state laws including specific references to electronic communication. They define cyberstalking as the use of internet, email or other electronic communication to stalk and generally refers to a pattern of threatening or malicious behavior. Sanctions range from misdemeanors to felonies. They define cyberharassment as differing from cyberstalking because it does not involve a credible threat. It usually pertains to threatening or harassing email messages, instant messages or blog entries that are dedicated to tormenting an individual. This website is reliable because it is directly related to the government, provides the date which it was updated and a variety of contact information.

Elder Abuse

- ▶ Over 4 million older adults are abused, exploited or mistreated by someone who is supposed to care for them and protect them
- ▶ Only 1 out of 24 cases are actually reported

Different Types

- ▶ Physical, sexual or emotional abuse (1 in 6 reported cases)
- ▶ Financial exploitation (1 in 8 reported cases)
- ▶ Neglect
- ▶ Abandonment

Solution

- ▶ Adult day care centers, education and public care centers



Stay Safe

- ▶ Avoid using your real name
- ▶ Avoid using information that can identify you
- ▶ Do not share personal information in public spaces
- ▶ Filter unwanted e-mails
- ▶ Use passwords that are unique and contain many characters; including numbers, capitals, etc.
- ▶ Set your social media profiles to "private"
- ▶ Do not respond to the harasser instead immediately contact the harasser's internet services provider (ISP)
